PLAN GOOD ROCK GARDEN

Errors can be avoided if the rock garden is properly planned. The rocks should appear natural, and vigorous plants should not be grown. Ask your county agent for detailed information on planning a good rock garden.

USE CORN FODDER

Old corn fodder can be scattered on the pasture or used to fill washes and gullies. Some farmers build check dams across the larger gullies with bundles of corn fodder.
